I expect registration for the January 2024 LTS will open in late September 2023 on the FCoC website. Last year the event was at capacity in Salons 3-4 at the Rosen Centre in Orlando. We have those same Salons in 2024 so please get your reservations in early so you and your team are guaranteed a seat to learn the latest changes from MOAA national for 2024, trade best practices with other Chapter leaders, compete for Chapter Health monetary awards for 2023, and plan out a great year for your Chapter in 2024.

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Chaplain's Message

"My friend and my neighbor you have put away from me, and darkness is my only companion." From Psalm 88, *The Book of Common Prayer*

For many Veterans – male, female; straight, gay; rich, poor; young, old; peacetime, wartime; married, single – this lament is very real and often results in another Veteran death by suicide.

While many of us may not completely understand or comprehend the enfolding and engulfing mental and spiritual darkness that drives a person to suicide, we may come face to face with a Veteran who, in a moment of trust and vulnerability, shares that darkness with us.

Will you know what to do?

A first response to that question may be, "This is a serious topic, I'm not a trained mental health professional, this is way beyond my capabilities." Yes, it is a serious topic. And yes, you're probably not a mental health professional.

But no, this *i*s in your capabilities. You *can* provide "first aid" for someone who expresses feelings of hopelessness, despair, and a desire to end their life.

And that "first aid" training is available from <u>The Fire Watch</u>, Florida's commitment to ending Veteran suicide. The training is available online and covers three major points: The importance of suicide prevention in the Veteran community, How to recognize warning signs of a Veteran in crisis, and How to direct a Veteran in crisis to either 9-8-8 or the Veteran Crisis Line.

By completing <u>The Fire Watch</u> training, you and your fellow MOAA chapter members will be able to SAVE a Veteran's life by knowing the **S**igns of suicidal thinking, **A**sking the most important question of all — "Are you thinking of killing yourself?", **V**alidating the Veteran's experience, and **E**ncouraging treatment and **E**xpediting help.

You can be the light in a Veteran's darkness. Contact <u>The Fire Watch</u> today at (https://www.thefirewatch.org/). Complete the individual online training AND arrange for a speaker to visit your MOAA chapter for an in-person group training. Be the difference, be the light.

Internet Security

Two guys are hiking in the woods in Alaska when they hear some rustling in the brush behind them. They both realize that they are being followed by a giant grizzly bear.

One of them takes off his backpack and pulls out a pair of running shoes. He sits down and starts removing his boots to put on the running shoes.

The other one says "Are you crazy? You can't outrun a grizzly."

As the first is getting up, he says "I don't need to out run the bear, I only need to outrun you."

It's the same on the internet.

Recently, the Palm Beach Chapter had an event at which the guest speaker was an internet security expert. He gave a great talk, which was even better as he spoke in English... everyday, non-technical English.

One point that he made repeatedly is the fact that most bad guys are *lazy*. If they try to hack you, and it seems pretty hard, they move onto the next target, of which there are gozillions. Basically, though nothing is *totally* bulletproof, as long as you are harder to hack than the next guy, you are



pretty safe.

Here are some simple things to do to put on your running shoes:

- —Get and keep internet anti-virus software on your computer. The guy suggested that none is particularly better than any other, but they need to installed and current. Don't let them expire. I'll add in that the bad guys send phishing attempts all the time imitating McAfee, Norton, and Avast. They all seek to get you to click on "renew now." In other words, keep track of who you use and know when it expires.
- —Delete unused apps. Every app that you have on your phone records information about you. With the exception of something such as Google Maps that has to know where you are to work, whenever an app asks to be allowed to track your location, say "no." If an app asks to be allowed to see your contacts, say "no." And if you never use an app, delete it. Nothing good comes from having others know about you.
- —Use "two factor authentication." Often known as "2FA," this is the system that requires that for you to open a website, the website first sends you a confirmation via another means of communication. Most often a text to your cell phone, this is extremely important for the websites for any financial institution with which you deal. Though not impossible for a bad guy to beat, it's really difficult and most bad guys will quickly move on to another target when faced with 2FA.
- Have a backup. This is actually very important. If you store information (such as passwords) in your phone and you lose it, you need to be able to get to it. Apple devices are pretty good at this. You can sync your iPhone with an iPad. Either has access to the data stored on the other.
- —Make your passwords difficult to guess. It's unbelievable how many people have simple passwords. According to Google, the most commonly used passwords are "123456," "qwerty," and the word "password."

When it comes to passwords, the longer the better. And be sure to use numbers, upper case and lower case letters, and special symbols. The problem, of course, is how to remember them.

Here's an effective way: Pick something that is easy to remember. Let's say that you went to OCS at Ft Benning in 1970. You could make your password "BenningOCS1970," but change it to "B3nn1Ng@c\$/97o." Then, make it unique to a website by adding a suffix.

For the MOAA National website, set your password to B3nn1Ng@c\$/97oMOAA. For USAA, set it to B3nn1Ng@c\$/97oUSAA.

He also suggested a "password manager." I have no experience with any of the password manages and don't really know anyone who says that they do. Supposedly, they are good, but I can't really say.

I can say that I've got my running shoes on.

Why an August Recess

Did you ever wonder why Congress recesses annually every August?

Here's an interesting answer to that question in an article written by Jim Saska, a reporter for the *Congressional Quarterly-Roll Call*, with input from Daniel S. Holt, an assistant historian at the Senate Historical Office.

The real reason Congress leaves Washington every August - Roll Call

In the lead up to this year's Congressional Summer Recess, MOAA President and CEO Lt. Gen. Brian T. Kelly, USAF (Ret), testified to the House Armed Services Quality of Life Roundtable on July 26.

In his testimony he detailed the topics that <u>our members are being asked to bring to the attention of Florida's Congressional delegation in seeking their support for legislation to address MOAA's agenda on behalf on the currently serving military, their families, military retirees and their dependents, and surviving spouses and children.</u>

His testimony underscored the urgency of implementing immediate actions and broad reforms to assist the currently serving military community. These topics also have a positive impact on maintaining the All-Volunteer-Force by enhancing the propensity to serve in the military.

He summarized those topics into:

- ✓ Compensation for the currently serving
- ✓ Health Care and prescription costs
- ✓ Military Housing maintenance and upgrades
- ✓ Enhancing Spousal Employment opportunities
- ✓ Childcare improvements



Defense Budget Policy Bill Negotiations Face Murky Waters

The NDAA has been passed out of Congress for 62 years and is considered must-pass legislation for Congress each year.

The House version of the NDAA **HR 2670**, passed 219-210 along party lines. Although the bill came out of the HASC on an almost unanimous vote, it was loaded up with very partisan amendments during the full House debate that were not supported by the Democrats hence the passage by only 9 votes. That's not a good sign for an easy negotiation in joint conference.

The Senate version **S 2226** passed on July 27th 86 – 11 with strong bipartisan support.

The House and Senate bills *differ significantly* on a host of contentious social issues. Despite the acrimony, key congressional leaders said this week they are confident the competing authorization bill drafts can be sorted out in inter-chamber negotiations, and that a compromise can be found sometime this fall. But history has a pattern of repeating itself.

For the past <u>27 years</u>, the FY began on October 1st with either a Continuing Resolution or a Shutdown, reflecting the difficulty in getting the <u>most</u> important funding bills through the legislative process.

What's in the House and Senate Bills

The **Senate FY24 NDAA calls for \$886 billion in spending**, in accordance with the Debt Ceiling deal thus avoiding a default on its obligations (negotiated between the House Republican majority and the President). However, the **House version of the NDAA calls for spending \$11 billion less.** A tough negotiation is expected in the conference given the lower topline number in the House bill.

While you won't find the **5.2% pay raise** for the currently serving in the legislative text of either the House or Senate version, Congress supported the pay raise by keeping it tied to the Employment Cost Index. Further it is expected that the corresponding Defense Appropriations bills may include a House Committee **proposal to provide a 30% pay boost**, **on average**, **for servicemembers E-6 and below** in the new year.

House language removes the Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) from the Basic Needs Allowance (BNA) eligibility calculations to ensure families struggling with food insecurity have access to this needed benefit. The Senate bill provides authority to the service secretaries to determine high-cost areas or "a demonstrated need" in the implementation of the BNA

The House version **expands the military spouse licensing and business costs reimbursement programs** through Work Opportunity Tax credits to employers,

The House NDAA includes a standardized program to provide discounted child care for DoD child care employees. Both NDAA versions address the need to focus on recruitment and retention of employees for child development programs.



Both the House and Senate **responded to MOAA's call for a pathway to restore TRICARE pharmacy network cuts** that have impacted beneficiary access to prescription drugs.

The House version contains language from the Expanding America's National Cemetery Act (H.R. 1413) requiring a joint report from DoD and the VA with "a proposal to increase national cemetery capacity through the expansion or modification of a national cemetery that has, or will have, the capacity to provide full military honors."

Disappointedly, the text of the Major Richard Star Act (S. 344/H.R. 1282) – which would authorize receipt of earned DoD retirement pay, without an offset, for those injured in combat and forced to medically retire – has NOT been included in either of this year's NDAAs. Under congressional rules this means that it cannot be added in during the joint conference reconciliation

Higher TRICARE Fees Proposed in Testimony from Congressional Budget Office

Written testimony submitted by the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) to a recent Senate subcommittee hearing on DoD personnel includes several proposals threatening service-earned benefits, such as the **introduction of TRICARE For Life fees and minimum out-of-pocket requirements.** Those options also were part of <u>a biennial report</u> from the CBO released last December. **MOAA's Call-To-Action at that time resulted in thousands of messages in opposition to TRICARE For Life fee increases from MOAA members to lawmakers**.

MOAA remains concerned by the proposals' inclusion in the Committee report on this hearing. The bottom line impact is stark:

- Proposed TRICARE For Life enrollment fees would cost Medicare-age beneficiaries \$575 a year for individual coverage or \$1,150 for family coverage.
- Proposed cost-sharing measures would include an \$850 deductible, meaning TRICARE For Life would not cover any of the first \$850 of a beneficiary's Medicare cost-sharing.
- After the deductible, the proposed cost-sharing plan allows TRICARE For Life to cover only 50% of the next \$7,650 in Medicare cost-sharing, meaning beneficiaries would pay up to \$4,675 in cost-sharing per year.

Please join in MOAA's Advocacy Mission once again to provide a counterpoint to CBO's written testimony by reminding Congress that our nation has an obligation to provide the health care benefit servicemembers and retirees have earned.

Communication with elected representatives is crucial to protecting earned benefits and

Governor DeSantis Signs Framework for Freedom Budget

FORT PIERCE, Fla. – Gov. Ron DeSantis signed the Framework for Freedom Budget for Fiscal Year 2023–24 on June 15, which totals \$116.5 billion for the people of Florida.

"Florida's Veteran community is very appreciative of Governor DeSantis' unwavering support of our 1.5 million Veterans, their families, and survivors," said retired Marine Corps Major General James S. "Hammer" Hartsell, Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. "With the full support of the Florida Legislature, the budget enhances our ability to provide first-class health care and benefit services to our Veterans and their families. The Sunshine State continues to be the most Veteran sought after state in the nation." The budget includes nearly \$500 million in Veteran-related support.

The Framework for Freedom Budget invests an additional \$6 million for medical and non-medical equipment upgrades, capital improvements, and increased staffing for the State Veterans' Nursing Homes. The budget also includes funds to begin planning for the construction of the ninth State Veterans' Nursing Home in Collier County. The budget also continues a \$2 million investment to assist veterans in securing meaningful skills-based employment, provide employers a skilled talent pipeline and to assist veterans in creating and operating a small business. Governor Announces Hometown Heroes Program Has Provided \$100 Million in Down Payment Assistance to Hometown Workers



This particular <u>Lone Sailor Navy Memorial</u> is located in Orlando at Blue Jacket Park in Baldwin Park, site of the former Navy/Recruit Training Center (N/RTC). The address is 2501 General Rees Avenue, Orlando, FL 32814. This Navy Memorial, dedicated on April 2nd, 2016, is a reminder of the Navy's presence in Central Florida, as well as an expression of gratitude to those sailors who have served, are currently serving, and shall serve in the United States Navy.

The Lone Sailor statue is the iconic symbol representing the United States Navy Memorial's mission to *Honor, Recognize, and Celebrate the men and women of the Sea Services, past, present, and future and to Inform the public about their service.* These meaningful statues provide a reminder to active duty, veterans, and civilians that they serve a grateful nation.

The Navy Memorial's Statue City Program began in 1997 with the placement of a Lone Sailor statue at Recruit Training Command in Great Lakes, IL. There are 18 Lone Sailor Statues in cities around the world, including the original on Navy Memorial Plaza in Washington, DC.

And the other in Florida Ft. Lauderdale.

And there are miniatures (22" tall) on 21 naval vessels.

MOAA's Cape Canaveral Chapter (MOAACC) Breaks their Own Record for JROTC Support

MOAACC's Good Deeds Foundation (GDF) Board recently approved the largest ever grant to support all 14 Brevard County JROTC and five related Cadet Units for the upcoming 2023-24 School Year.

Following a year in which donors and their annual Golf Tournament produced over \$120K in funds, GDF's four pillars will all receive increased support: (1) Active Duty Military; (2) Veterans in Need; (3) JROTC, ROTC, other Cadet units; and (4) Veteran Organizations like Space Coast Honor Flight, Wreaths Across America and National Veterans Homeless Support. The GDF dispenses grants equal to what is received each year, less \$5K in reserve, and the amount has gone up 10 percent or more the past five years----even during COVID.



The GDF was able to present every JROTC program with \$2200 each, and 2 Civil Air Patrol units, 2 Sea Cadet units, and the Sea Scout Ship with \$1200 each, as the new school year began. In addition, the GDF will purchase every county and district trophy and medal for seven Raider Challenge, Air Rifle and Drill events, estimated at \$3600, thus saving the JROTC units over \$250 per school. The total package will thus exceed \$36,000. MOAACC is very proud of its impactful GDF 501(c) 3 supporting the youth in our community.



In 2022, MOAACC's Good Deeds Foundation received donations of \$110k, including \$35k raised at the GDF annual Golf tournament and more than \$40k from major donors.

Grants included:

- Funding of 15 JROTC units, one College ROTC unit, and five other cadet units for a total of \$39,000 to support their programs in the 2022-23 school year.
- \$19,000 to support veterans and families in need.



- More than \$9000 for Space Coast Honor Flight, Wreaths Across America, and programs at the VA Cape Canaveral National Cemetery.
- More than \$20,000 for active duty military unit foundations for all six service branches on the Space Coast.

Scholarship Corporation:

Donations in the past two years increased available funds, allowing ten \$5,000 scholarships to college juniors through Graduate School in 2022, and at least \$50,000 for ten or more recipients in 2023.

2023 MOAACC Scholarship Awards

On July 18, 2023, The Military Officers Association of America, Cape Canaveral Chapter (MOAACC) held its 40th Annual Scholarship Awards Luncheon at the Indian River Colony Club (IRCC) in Melbourne, Fl.

This year twelve recipients, all college juniors, seniors, graduate students and descendants of area military veterans, were selected. Each received a \$5,000 scholarship, for a total of \$60,000 in awards. The MOAACC Scholarship Corporation was established in 1984, beginning with a \$1,000 award. To date, 284 students have received MOAACC Scholarships with a total dollar value of \$860,000. MOAACC Scholarships are primarily funded through the generous contributions of chapter members over the years.


